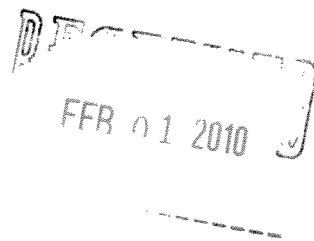

2. **Has your committee been successful in developing programs that enable attorneys to assist your low-income population? Please describe the program(s). If not, why not.**

We continue to have monthly Pro Se Self-Help sessions and have a large volunteer attorney pool helping with that program. We have sent a list of attorneys to our local legal aid office who indicated they would be willing to take pro bono cases, and 0 cases have been referred as of 2009. A couple of the attorneys who expressed a willingness to take on cases work for government offices and are barred from actually representing clients. Another private attorney said she would be willing to provide a consultation to an indigent person, but no cases have been referred.

Our local plan called for legal assistant students from UNM-Gallup to assist pro se litigants by preparing final orders for the Judges' signature. CD and tape logs have been made and forms provided to the local college, but we have not had any students participate in the program in 2009.

Four attorneys have expressed an interest in sponsoring a legal workshop. To date One attorney has provided a free Domestic Relations workshop to the public.

4. Has your committee attempted to develop programs that have been unsuccessful in attracting assistance from pro bono attorneys?

A survey was sent to each McKinley County attorney. We received 16 responses (8 government attorneys). We had 11 attorneys who were willing to give legal advice at our monthly pro se sessions. We had 8 attorneys interested in conducting a free clinic for the public. We have 6 attorneys interested in reviewing final orders prepared by UNM Students. We had 4 attorneys willing to draft pleadings for income eligible people.

We have scheduled the 11 attorneys to work the pro se clinic. We have had one attorney give a Domestic Relations Clinic during 2009.

5. Please quantify the number of your low-income population who have benefited from your programs. Provide detail by program, if possible (i.e. clinical attendance, direct representation, etc.)

An intake form is completed by each person attending our monthly Pro Se sessions. There was a total of 150 people attending these sessions in 2009. Approximately 10% are not indigent. Therefore, we helped 135 indigent people at the Pro Se session. We also held a Domestic Relations 101 Session on How to Represent Yourself in Court. 6 people attended.

6. What do you see as the greatest impediment to securing pro bono assistance for your District's low income people? Please quantify the impediment, if possible.

Too high of an indigent population needing assistance for the amount of attorneys in the area. 70% of McKinley County is indigent, and would qualify for legal services, however, we have too few attorneys available to meet the need. We have 16 private attorneys in the Gallup area. The remainder of the bar are government attorneys.

7. Do you anticipate your current pro bono program to maintain its current status and/or grow in subsequent years? Please explain.

We anticipate our program growing once we can incorporate the UNM-Gallup legal assistant students. They could assist low income self-represented litigants in drafting up pleadings and final orders. We would also like to have attorneys hold public legal clinics on a bi-monthly basis to provide education. Both of these programs will allow more of the public to access the courts as a self-represented litigant.

8. **Did your committee participate in New Mexico Pro Bono Week and if so, were the public functions sponsored during that week successful? Please quantify public participation. If not, please describe why the public functions were not successful. Do you intend to include similar functions in your on-going pro bono plans?**

Yes, we participated in the New Mexico Pro Bono Week. The Public functions of the appreciation luncheon, presentation of certificates of appreciation and the one-hour CLE for a \$1 was very successful. We had 38 attorneys in attendance.

The Domestic Relations 101 clinic was only attended by 6 people, and not as successful as we would have hoped. It was snowing that evening which could have affected attendance, and we were not able to publicize it enough in advance to get a better response.

The committee would like to see more public clinics and we will definitely try this again.

Dear Counsel:

The New Mexico Supreme Court has mandated that local judicial districts develop and implement plans to provide pro bono assistance to indigent person with both the private bar and attorneys employed by governmental entities. The Supreme Court has modified Rule 16-601 relating to Professional Conduct and has adopted Rule 24-108 Governing the State Bar, both of which are attached to this letter for your review.

The Eleventh Judicial District Court's Pro Bono Committee in Gallup has identified a number of common legal problems faced by low-income individuals, namely, Domestic Relations. These issues include preparing an Order after a hearing and general legal advice. The pro se litigants would also benefit from a explanation of NMRA, Rule 1-004 dealing with service of process.

The attorneys at New Mexico Legal Aid in Gallup do not have the resources to help all low-income persons who require assistance. In addition, the Eleventh Judicial District Court has a monthly *Pro Se Session* to assist pro se litigants, the majority of whom are low-income, but many litigants need more help than we are able to offer. Finally, the Eleventh Judicial District Court has provided domestic relations training for attorneys free of charge and is willing continue to provide this training. New Mexico Legal Aid is willing to provide a class to pro se litigants on how to file a divorce, including a Rule 1-004 explanation. We need attorneys to conduct these classes on a monthly basis with guidance from New Mexico Legal Aid.

We are asking each licensed attorney from McKinley County to complete the enclosed information survey form so we can measure the general level of interest and willingness to help with the defined legal need of the low-income population in the Eleventh Judicial District. It is very important that we hear from you so we can implement our Pro Bono plan in accordance with the State Supreme Court's expectations.

National Pro Bono Week Celebration

October 26-30, 2009, is ABA National Celebrate Pro Bono Week. The National Pro Bono Week Celebration focuses attention to the legal work lawyers do in their communities to improve the lives of friends and neighbors. According to a study in February 2009, nearly three quarters of lawyers in the United States report doing pro bono work. "We believe the American Bar Association recommendation that each lawyer performs a minimum of 50 hours of pro bono service each year allows the legal community to support a greater community" says Mark Schickman, chair of the ABA Standing Committee on Pro Bono and Public Service.

The local Pro Bono Committee chaired by District Judge Grant L. Foutz, has planned a variety of events throughout the week. On Tuesday, October 27, 2009, Justice Richard C. Bosson of the New Mexico Supreme Court and Sara Singleton of Montgomery & Andrews, P.A. and co-chair of the New Mexico Access to Justice will visit Gallup for a luncheon at the El Rancho Hotel to present Certificates of Appreciation to twenty-nine McKinley County Attorneys and two Cibola County attorneys who have provide pro bono legal services to McKinley County's indigent population.

Afterwards Ms. Singleton will provide a 1 hour Professionalism continuing legal education presentation for attorneys for \$1. Attorneys are required to obtain twelve hours of continuing legal education per year and must usually travel out-of-town or take an internet course to meet this obligation.

On Wednesday, October 28, 2009, a free public event will be held at the District Court, 207 W. Hill, Historic Courtroom, Gallup, NM at 6:00 p.m. Richard C. Wade, Esq. of Advocate Law Center in Gallup, will present a course entitled "Domestic Relations – How to Represent Yourself in Court." Participants will learn about representing themselves in court; the rules of service; how child support is figured out, jurisdiction, and how to call witnesses and present evidence in court. There will also be a short presentation on the Access & Visitation Program located at Battered Families Services Inc. that provides safe exchanges and supervised visitation for families.



On that same day there will be ¼ page appreciation ad listing all the attorneys above and advertising a free community pro bono event in the Gallup Independent.


On Thursday, October 29, 2009, Richard Wade, Esq. of Advocate Law Center will provide a free Domestic Relations Presentation for the pro se litigant.

SARAH MICHAEL SINGLETON

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Sarah Michael Singleton is a shareholder in Montgomery & Andrews, P.A. She received her B.A. from Sarah Lawrence College in 1971 and her J.D. from Indiana University in Bloomington in 1974. During law school, Ms. Singleton served as an editor of the Indiana Law Journal. She graduated magna cum laude and was elected to Order of the Coif. In 1974 Ms. Singleton was admitted to the New Mexico Bar. She is also a member of the Texas Bar. Additionally, Ms. Singleton is admitted to practice before the United States District Court for the District of New Mexico, the Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals, the United States Court of Federal Claims, and the United States Supreme Court. She is a member of the American Bar Association. Ms. Singleton's primary areas of practice are natural resources litigation, products liability litigation, and employment law. Ms. Singleton also serves as a settlement mediator and as an arbitrator in numerous types of matters. For her work in the natural resources area, Ms. Singleton has been recognized by Chambers USA, Best Lawyers in America, and Southwest Super Lawyers, which listed her as one of the top twenty-five lawyers in New Mexico in 2009.

Ms. Singleton was President of the State Bar of New Mexico (1995-96) and a member of the Board of Bar Commissioners (1989 - 1997). In 2006 Ms. Singleton received a presidential appointment which was confirmed by the Senate to serve as a member of Board of the Legal Services Corporation. Ms. Singleton serves as Co-Chair of the New Mexico Commission on Access to Justice. From its inception until 2007, Ms. Singleton was the chair of the New Mexico Civil Legal Services Commission, which distributes state funds to organizations serving the legal needs of people living in poverty. From 1997 to 2004, Ms. Singleton served as co-chair of the State Bar's Legal Services and Program Committee, which is the State Bar committee responsible for civil access to justice issues. Ms. Singleton also served two terms on the ABA Standing Committee on Legal Aid and Indigent Defendants. She served as chair of the ABA SCLAID Task Force on Revising the ABA Standards for the Provision of Civil Legal Aid. Ms. Singleton previously served as chair of the board of trustees of the former Northern New Mexico Legal Services program, as a member of the board of directors of the New Mexico Center on Law and Poverty, and on the board of the Equal Access to Justice Campaign. Ms. Singleton has received the State Bar's Distinguished Service Award, in part for her work on access to justice issues. She has also received a Pioneer Award for her initiative in creating the Lawyer's Care Program, the State Bar of New Mexico's pro bono program dedicated to assisting legal services providers. In 2007 the State Bar honored Ms. Singleton's efforts to obtain access to justice for low income people by giving her the President's Life Time Achievement Award. In 2008 Ms. Singleton was awarded the ABA's Pro Bono Publico Award for her work on access to justice issues.

provide free legal services for the poor. Here in Gallup, we have the *pro se* clinic. *Pro se* refers to people representing themselves. Every month, local lawyers go over to the McKinley County Courthouse to meet with unrepresented folks to help them fill out forms or generally discuss the legal process. The lawyers do not act as your counsel if you go, but they can provide a great deal of free information that may help you.

You may not be aware that some of the most important cases in American history were handled by attorneys working for free. Many United States Supreme Court cases involved lawyers providing *pro bono* services. Try and find that in other professions. Next time a doctor is on television discussing some major surgery that they performed, call them and ask if the services were rendered for free.

They will laugh and laugh . . .

The point is that we acknowledge as a profession that it is not all about making money. Most lawyers, including myself, set aside a certain portion of their practice to benefit the poor and to vindicate critical rights.

So don't believe everything you see on TV. Lawyers deserve more credit than that.

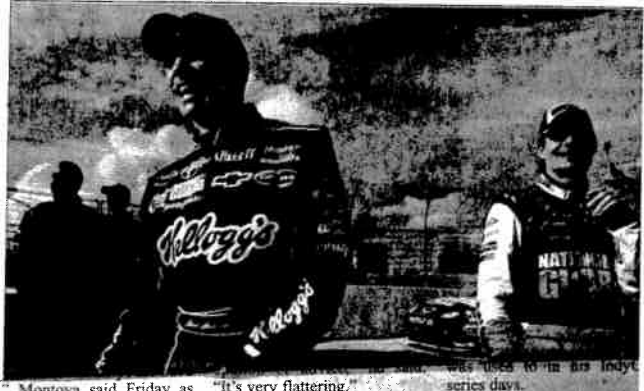
